

After experiencing trouble with the twin New Way engine not getting gas, it turned out the whole cast iron base was full of rust and had clogged up the strainer. I went on the internet and looked at all the YouTube videos of how people got rid of the rust, and the simplest and cheapest (like I had to say that) was to fill it up with distilled white vinegar 5% and let it do the magic.





After six days. As you can see from the pictures the bottom and sides were clean and rust free, but right near the top a little rust sheen was left. Maybe that would have been removed had I left it a few more days. The brass inlet screen was totally crusted up, and now is excellent after draining it all out, washing it out repeatedly, then soaking it in a solution of baking soda and water to stop the acid action. Then I rinsed that out, dried it and fogged it with WD-40. So, if you don't want to grind and sand and you don't want to sandblast, this process works really well.

Bonus tip: Fill the bleach dispenser in your washing machine with vinegar. Your clothes will come out soft and smelling fresh. Rob



WAPA History By Tom Millett Assisted by: Charter Member Bill Baldwin

Most current members either have foggy or no knowledge of the founding of our great club. Charter Member Bill Baldwin is the sole survivor of the founding group that gave it a start. Some years before it was an official organization a small group of engine owners that were disenchanted with the atmosphere at the Vista club would meet at Bill Brinkley's house. They would bring their latest engines and Bill would provide a few snacks. Palmer Bochow, John Baldwin & son Bill, and Doug & Bob Vermillion were among the originators. Eventually they began meeting at other homes, including Baldwin's. Brinkley was the first named president, but it wasn't until Bill Baldwin became the second president between 1977 and 1979 that things started happening.

They eventually expanded their group to include Don Riley and his father Allen, Joe and Margaret Mueller. Bill spearheaded a pig roast each year for four or five years at different homes. They would have sand blasting meets. He got the group to display engines at different places that would have them, including the old Corvette and Porsche swap meet (before George Cross) in Pomona. Someone that Bill knew had a contact that got the group to display some engines at Knott's Berry Farm for a week in the spring. That became a regular event each year and led to the purchase of the club trailer in 1981. It was altered for club use by cutting holes for gas cans and power plant anchors, among other things. This was all done in Bill's yard. Corn grinding started with the Knott's shows. A corn grinder with an elevator was found. They powered it with a member's large engine.

On October 5, 1978, also during Bill's term as President, they attained the services of an attorney who prepared the Articles of Incorporation that were filed with the Secretary of State for incorporation as a tax exempt organization called Western Antique Power Associates, Inc. The non-profit status was given section 501(C)4 of the federal tax code. That status is social welfare, civic and political issues. However, all contributions are subject to a gift tax and all income spent is taxable.

It wasn't until many years later that under the leadership of President Bob Swan, research by two members of the board of directors, Kelley Garcia and Rob Skinner, prompted WAPA to apply for and eventually receive 501(C)3 status which is charitable, scientific or educational. Under that status, within reason, contributions or income spending is not taxable. Over the years, some changes have taken place, but not many. Emphasis on revenue sources was important during a long period, largely from multi-week shows at Knott's Berry Farm, Orange County Fair and Los Angeles County Fair. Many hours of prep work and scheduling of volunteer help could wear one thin. Many members simply got "burned out" from working at their employment all day, then working a four hour shift for a WAPA show.

During the mid 1990's, while deceased member Bob Swan was president, and with considerable influence by him, the club Board of Directors sanctioned setting aside a certain percentage of revenue to a special museum fund. That fund has grown over the years to a point that the organization can and should be strongly focusing on establishment of a home, lest we will forever be viewed a group of nomads.

The WAPA organization has been very stable for many years. It was not always that way. During the late 80's and early 90's, and then again in the early turn of the century things were quite vitriolic. Power struggles found many members very disenchanted. In recent years with new, younger members taking an interest in promoting good will, WAPA is now on a very pleasant roll. No longer are we an engine club. We have gladly accepted and encouraged tractor owners to be a large part of our organization. What does the future bring? I say it will be a very educational organization because as older generations die off, the younger population will have no idea what these machines do, or the history of 20th century farm life.
