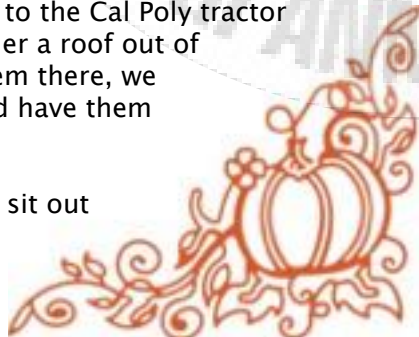
President's Report By Bob Smith
