# Part 3: My Sattley "The Clean Up" By Bob Smith

I like to follow a simple rule. If you see some signs of original paint and maybe some pin striping then leave the engine as original as possible. I know that the engine did not look that bad when it left the factory, but it adds a little of the antique nature to the engine. Since this engine had no visible signs of paint and due to the magnitude of the rust, I decided to sand blast this engine prior to painting. I didn't feel that rust was a good patina and with some missing parts, they would stick out on a rusty engine. With the amount of sandblasting I needed to do to clear the rust down to bare metal, I convinced myself to purchase a 220 volt, 60 gallon, 2 cylinder air compressor to keep up with the duty cycle of blasting for 30 minutes at a time.

All parts that were going to be reused were blasted down to bare metal. Now comes the age old guestion. Do I paint the badly pitted cast iron parts or smooth them out so the engine has a little nicer appearance? I know that I could never match the smoothness of a Merle Morse engine but I figured I could give it a shot. I used a grinder in some areas to smooth out rough casting areas and where the mold came together, and finished it with glazing putty to make it smooth. This had to be applied several times to get a good look. After the final glazing, the part was painted with a Rustoleum automotive gray primer. Since this took a very long time, I would work on only 1 part at a time—blasting it, grinding, glazing, and priming. Now that all my parts are primed and ready for paint, check the next issue of the Hit-N-Miss for the repairing and replacing of broken and missing parts.


