Update on the Dodger Tractor By Bob Smith

This past Saturday, February 13, we gathered at the Cal Poly tractor shop to prepare to repaint the blue on the International Cub which was donated by the Dodger organization.

I purchased 2 quarts of Rust Oleum Farm Equipment Ford Blue through Home Depot on-line. This paint looks a little closer to Dodger blue. We mixed the paint and Lance Wilson sprayed the tractor. What a difference in the color. No more metallic. The Ford Blue covered the metallic blue very well.



The cowl and wheels were painted white but they did not come out gloss so I decided to purchase some new automotive white and clear coat made by Rust Oleum through Home Depot online. I measured for Dodger decals and went down to the graphics shop in Chino where the sweeper company gets all their decals made to have them custom-make some for the side of the cowl and back of the seat.

The weekend of February 20 we will start to put the tractor back together, and the next weekend we will repaint the white on the cowl and wheels. After it dries, we will apply the decals and then clear coat the tractor. We want to have the tractor ready for the Farm-2-Table event at Cal Poly on April 9. If all goes well, we should make it.

Another project we finished is a wagon which is used outside of the Farm Store to display produce and artifacts. We painted the frame John Deere Green and the wheels John Deere Yellow. Tom Millett finished it off with some John Deere decals for the frame rails. It should be outside the Farm Store by our next board meeting. Stop and take a look at it.

Since shows are scheduled on the first 2 Saturdays in April there will be no WAPA Meeting.


Now is the time to check your ramps, winches, batteries, trailer tires and brakes before all of our activities. And, don't forget to check that stale gas in your engines too.

Below is a list of all of the shows which are scheduled for the months of March and April. This is in light of the fact that there will not be a Hit 'N' Miss newsletter published for the month of April.

Iron Horse—Family Steampunk Carnivale, Orange Empire Railway Museum, Perris, CA March 19 - March 20, Saturday and Sunday, Setup: Gates open at 6:00 am, set-up needs to be completed by 7:00 am. Show: 9:00 am until 5:00 pm.

This is the first time WAPA has been invited to this two-day event. This show will include festivities geared for the entire family as homage is paid to the Victorian Era, Edwardian science fiction and the Industrial Revolution with the museum's steampowered locomotive as the backdrop. Events and activities include steam locomotive and vintage trolley rides, shows and concerts. The Orange Empire Railway Museum is the West's largest collection of railway locomotives, passenger and freight cars, streetcars and electric trolleys. The museum is located at 2201 S. "A" Street in Perris, CA, off the 215 Freeway approximately 10 miles S. of Riverside. Free dry camping is available Saturday night to all WAPA members.

The Maytag Washing Machine Co. was founded in 1893 by businessman Frederick Maytag. In 1925, the company became Maytag, Inc. During the Great Depression of the 1930's, the company was one of the few to actually make a profit in successive years.

Maytag Gyratator Washers were made in the 1920's and 30's. I believe this one was made in 1933," says McDonough. "I bought the machine from a local man and paid \$1,500 for it. I've never seen another one like it."

The belt-driven Maytag Gyratator washing machine could also be used as a butter churn and an ice cream maker. The owner simply removed the agitator and slipped the butter churn, ice cream maker on in its place. Or, he could remove the wringer and fit a standard meat grinder onto the wringer post. The meat grinder was shaftdriven the same way as the wringer.

Back in the good old days it was possible to do a lot of household chores with certain machines, says Steve McDonough, Spring Valley, Wis., who displayed a rare oldtime washing machine last summer at the Minnesota State Fair.
