Craig M. Maxwell, Civil Engineer, died unexpectedly on Saturday, December 30, 2017 at the age of 65 in an accident unhooking a trailer at his property in Riverside. Craig was born on October 25, 1952 in White Plains, New York to Robert and Ruth (Geiffert) Maxwell. He married Rebecca Everhart on November 26, 1977 in Reno. Craig graduated from Vista High School in 1970 and got his BS in Civil Engineering from Cal Poly Pomona in 1974.

Craig is survived by his wife Rebecca Maxwell, his four children Teresa, Cheryl, James & Carl, his sister Candy Wooding, and many beloved nieces and nephews.

Craig worked for 44 years as a registered civil engineer in the heavy civil construction industry. He worked for large general contractors including Kiewit, Brutoco Engineering & Construction, and most recently Shimmick Construction. He was proud to work with crews that built bridges and other structures in California – his last project was the Gerald Desmond Bridge Replacement project in Long Beach.

A passion that Craig had was collecting antique construction equipment – he never saw a crane (no matter how old and rusted) that he didn't like and want to take home to join his collection. He was an active member and volunteer for years in the Historical Construction Equipment Association (HCEA), which is a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving the history of construction equipment, and the American Truck Historical Society (ATHS) where he was an active member in the Southern California Chapter and in 2017 won an award for most unusual entry at their annual truck show.

The family will be hosting a memorial event on February 3, 2018 at 10:00 am at The Orange Empire Railroad Museum located at 2201 South S Street, Perris, CA 92570. It will be a casual event (jeans are okay!) to reflect and celebrate his life, and enjoyment of collecting antique equipment. The past couple weeks have been interesting for the Steve McQueen Show. This is a huge fundraiser for the Boys Republic that involves collectors worldwide. Every year, the theme of the show is one of Steve's movies, and the movie

As part of the show, the Bullitt Mustang collectors will be bringing their cars from across the country to converge on the Boy's Republic for the Steve McQueen Car Show. Gasket making tips By Kelley Garcia

Have you ever needed an extra pair of hands to tap out a gasket? I ran into this problem when I needed to make repairs to our FM-Z engine. Not only is the casting very intricate, but my gasket paper was a roll of material instead of a flat sheet. After fighting the paper with the nasty curl for a bit over an hour, I sat back and started thinking of some options to hold the gasket in place while I tapped it out with my ball peen hammer.

Unfortunately, in the middle of the day, there just aren't many people around to help. Maybe I could have trained my Border Collies to hold the material, but they would have also spent the whole time licking my face as I was trying to make the gasket. So I thought about it a little more and came up with trying out some rare earth magnets that I had. These things worked out perfectly! I tapped out the gasket in no time, without any hassle at all.

I purchased these rare earth magnets on Ebay. They were a quantity of 50, 1/2 x 1/8 inch "Neodymium Disc Magnets Super Strong Rare Earth Magnet" for just under \$13.00. I bought more than I needed for a different project I had worked on, because, well, who doesn't need extra magnets lying around?

I brushed on a little Copper Coat gasket sealer, bolted the cover back on (just 2 bolts hold that darned thing) and I was back in business!
